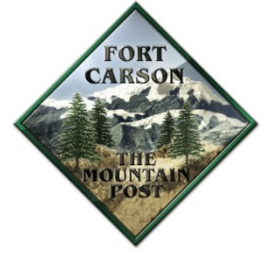

****Fort Carson declared a Public Health Emergency as of 9 a.m. March 24, 2020 — below are current conditions****

Installation and Services:

- **All gates and the Gate 1 and 3 Visitor Control Centers remain open at this time.**
- Installation access is be limited to DOD official business (which includes AAFES, DECA, DOD contract work, DA civilian and military personnel), DOD-affiliated personnel (which includes veterans, retirees, dependents, DA civilians and Soldiers). Non-DOD visitors will need O-6 commander approval memo.
- Only **readiness critical** contractors will be allowed. Contact your organization to determine your duty status.
- Delivery drivers must come in through Gate 3 for screening and access.
- Rideshare and taxi services must come in through Gate 3 for screening and access and are only approved to drop off DOD ID card holders; no access to pick up personnel.
- Mountain Post Shuttle is limited to two riders per trip.
- Child development centers and school age centers are open to **readiness-critical** families only. Hourly care is for parents who have medical appointments only, and they will be asked to show their appointment slip at drop off. The Youth Center and Youth Sports operations are temporarily suspended, and Child and Youth Services is not providing any Outreach Services/KOS child care. Parent Central is continuing to operate and register and enroll Families into care who are deemed readiness critical.
- Hourly day care is for verified medical appointments only.
- Patrons will be required to clean their hands prior to entering any common facilities.
- DPW will maintain an emergency work-order capability.
- DFMWR activities remain suspended.
- Kennels/stables closed to new customers.
- **AAFES/DeCA facilities continue to offer a high-risk-only timeframe and an active-duty-only timeframe, but may be restricted only to active duty and active-duty dependents outside of high-risk times (see the [4ID & Fort Carson Information Sheet](#) for current hours).**

Fort Carson Training and Readiness:

- All local training events not defined as “readiness critical” are **postponed** or **cancelled**.
- Soldiers are authorized individual or “buddy-team” physical training **ONLY**.
- All installation gyms, including unit-level, remain **closed**.
- SRP will be by **appointment only** and reserved only for 627th HC.
- SFL-TAP will be by **appointment only**, and reserved for individuals within 60 days of separation.
- In/out processing from Fort Carson will be by **appointment only**.
- CIF out-processing is by **appointment only**.
- Integrated Disability Evaluation System (IDES) is **paused**.
- READY-Range, Golf Course and POW Range are **closed**.
- Other activities designated by the chain of command that support good order and discipline, morale, behavioral health, health and welfare are **authorized**.

Medical Readiness:

- Soldiers, DOD civilians, contractors and dependents returning from OCONUS (including Alaska and Hawaii) will be evaluated in accordance with Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and DHS guidelines.
- All Soldier dental operations consolidated to Smith Dental Clinic.
- Medical pre-screening will be conducted at key facilities (AAFES, Commissary, EACH, 4ID HQ)
- All troop-school physical examinations are postponed until further notice (i.e., Ranger, Airborne, WOCS)

Duty Status Definitions

Readiness-Critical Persons:

These persons are designated to support readiness critical activities approved by the 4ID Command Group. Such personnel are generally required to report to duty on post as directed by unit leadership. Duty days can entail shift work, telework, nights, weekends and federal/training holidays. Readiness critical personnel include only the following persons: those individuals previously identified as “mission essential” in the case of an extreme weather event; those individuals subject to current prepare-to-deploy orders (PTDO) in support of COVID-19 response; those individuals deemed critical to preparing, supporting, and/or sustaining said COVID-19 PTDO personnel; those individuals deemed critical to their respective units’ COVID-19 response; those contractor employees who are assessed as necessary and critical by their respective contracting officers and contracting officer representatives, consistent with HHQ guidance, the performance work statement, and the statement of work; and those persons who do not fall within one of the above readiness critical sub-categories but whose work on Fort Carson is critical to the continuity of necessary operations (e.g., certain IHG/Army Hotel employees).

Non-Readiness Critical but Readiness Essential Persons:

These persons are designated by the unit as not being required to support approved readiness critical activities, but are designated to support approved readiness essential activities. Although these personnel would normally be required to report to duty on post as directed by their leadership, while the installation is in a readiness critical status, these personnel are not to work on post without an exception to policy approved by an O-6 commander or the 4ID chief of staff. Regardless of duty location, duty days for persons in this category can entail shift work, telework, nights, weekends and federal/training holidays. Individuals in this category are still considered to be on duty throughout their normal duty day. To the maximum extent possible, these individuals will continue performing regular duties at their home of residence (e.g., telework). Units will establish standards for how and when these individuals will report for daily accountability, perform physical readiness training (military personnel only), and maintain contact with their leaders and subordinates. Leaders will conduct routine inspections and health and welfare checks of military personnel to the extent possible and in the interest of good order and discipline. Individuals will not consume alcohol during normal duty hours (6:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. for military personnel, excluding weekends and federal/training holidays) and military personnel will maintain the grooming standards set forth in the 4ID Green Book.

Non-Readiness Critical/Non-Readiness Essential Persons:

These persons are designated by the unit as not being required to support approved readiness critical or approved readiness essential activities. Said personnel are still considered to be on duty throughout the normal duty day, not to include weekends or federal/training holidays. The place of duty for individuals in this category will be their home of residence. To the extent possible, these individuals will continue performing regular duties while at their home of residence (e.g., telework). Units will establish standards for how and when these individuals will report for daily accountability, perform physical readiness training (military personnel only), and maintain contact with their leaders and subordinates. Leaders will conduct routine inspections and health and welfare checks of military personnel to maintain good order and discipline. Individuals will not consume alcohol during normal

duty hours (6:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. for military personnel, excluding weekends and federal/training holidays) and military personnel will maintain the grooming standards set forth in the 4ID Green Book.

Command-Directed Quarantine/Isolation:

The term “quarantine” refers to the status of asymptomatic personnel who traveled to a designated CDC high-risk area within specified timeframes, or who had contact with someone who tested positive for COVID-19 as verified by Fort Carson Public Health. The term “isolation” refers to the status of symptomatic personnel (fever of greater than 100.4, cough, or shortness of breath) who have either been tested for COVID-19 and are pending results or are a confirmed positive COVID-19 case verified by Fort Carson Public Health. Note that before ordering any individual into isolation, coordination with the Fort Carson Public Health Emergency Officer (PHEO) or the PHEO’s designee is required. Both quarantine and isolation data is consolidated by 4ID G33 for their reporting. Note that the terms “quarantine” and “isolation” for the purposes of this order apply to the current COVID-19 environment and applied CDC criteria.

Special Duty status:

These are individuals who fall outside the categories listed above. Military personnel who have primary responsibility for children due to the closure of schools and/or child care facilities are subject to modified requirements at their respective leaders’ discretion. Additional examples of special duty status include, but are not limited to: leave/pass; TDY; and sick-in-quarters (i.e., for reasons other than COVID-19 concerns).
